








2023 U.S. DONATED PROSTHETIC PARTS PROGRAM 6,098 prosthetic parts were donated to LFL by 281 donors from 40 states



In addition to the 158 funded clients, approximately 684 amputee parts-only clients received help through the distribution of 3,421 parts and components throughout 27 US States & Internationally.

INTERNATIONAL PROSTHETIC PARTS & COMPONENTS PROGRAM 2023




LFL shares parts with missions and industry partners for both individual parts-only clients and bulk distribution of parts on the following continents:

All told, funding new prosthetic limbs, providing resource referrals and sharing parts domestically and internationally, Limbs for Life helps over 2,000 amputees each year.












Client Income/National Poverty Level

- → Average income of clients served was 131% of the poverty level;
- → Mississippi, Oklahoma & Texas account for 75% of all LFL clients. The combined average client income average for these three states was 65% below the Federal Poverty Level.
- → Household income of 88% of clients served was below 138% of the Federal Poverty Level (eligibility level for Medicaid)
- → Oklahoma & Mississippi Medicaid Expansion only began approving limited coverage for prosthetics for SOME adult amputees over the age of 18 in 2023 and 2024 respectively, leaving a significant percentage of individuals without help or hope. Most states have resources for children under age 19; but at 19, youth are often left uninsured, and still in need of prosthetic care. Texas Medicaid does not cover prosthetic care over age 20.
- → Because most insurance requires a rider for prosthetic care, many new amputees also fall into this service gap.



The above chart exhibits Limbs for Life's breakdown of Functional Expenses.

The influx of applications following Covid, resulted in more than \$1,000,000 being transferred from investment income for prosthetic costs between calendar years 2021 & 2022.

2023 budget restructuring directed all overhead and administrative costs be covered by LFL's annual investment (endowment) distributions, thereby ensuring 100%

of all revenue from general donations, foundations, grants (unless otherwise designated) and fundraising events, are for the sole and restricted use of providing the financial assistance required to give new prosthetic limbs and access to quality care to amputees without resources.

Limbs for Life does not receive any state or federal funding.



Limbs for Life was named as a beneficiary of a certain revocable trust in 2012. In 2016 the trust transitioned to irrevocable, and the trustee began the lengthy process of liquidating assets. Notified in 2017 LFL was a partial beneficiary of this generous Trust, distributions were received from 2017 through 2021.

Limbs for Life participates in an endowment fund with the Oklahoma City Community Foundation (OCCF). OCCF is a not-for-profit entity that provides for endowed contributions to be pooled to maximize return on investments for the benefit of area not-for-profit organizations.

- 2) Invest a substantial portion of these distributions in income producing assets, enabling the Foundation to provide services well into the future.
- 3) Ensure funds cover all aspects of operational, administrative and overhead costs.

Note: To manage balance concentrations, LFL maintains a bank account for holding funds in excess of FDIC insured limits. This is a sweep account where funds are swept daily to other banking institutions, ensuring balances are kept under FDIC limits.
